April is Frog Month! Frogs are an important species in any ecosystem, acting as both predator and prey in the food web.

Like other amphibians, frogs are also considered to be indicator species.

Biologists (and citizen scientists) will monitor for populations in an area to help gauge the overall health of their habitat because they are so affected by changes. Frogs' skin is *permeable*, meaning that things can easily pass through it. This allows them to both breathe and drink through their skin, but it also means they are very susceptible to pollutants or other changes in their environment. When the health of a frog population declines, this usually indicates that there is a shift in pollutants. A healthy and stable frog population generally indicates a healthy environment with clean water.

Volunteerism is a pillar of our organization. To all the volunteers who donate your time to Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre - **THANK YOU**.


ON THE WILD SIDE:

Happy spring, happy spring. Many residents of Wye Marsh are returning from migration or emerging from hibernation. Red-Winged Blackbirds, a Garter Snake, chipmunks, and others have all been spotted enjoying the sunny weather and double-digit temperatures of late. Soon the marsh will erupt with sounds of frog choruses, and turtles will make their way to breeding sites.

With the changing of seasons we are more likely to encounter wildlife when out exploring – both young and adult. It is important to respect wildlife as we share their habitat when we are out exploring. Here are few reasons why you should give wildlife their space:

- When approached, wildlife may startle and panic potentially causing harm to themselves or you when they try to escape.
- If wildlife feel threatened, especially if they have young nearby, they may attack and cause harm to you or themselves in defense.
- Young animals, including birds, deer fawns, rabbits and other mammals may be left alone for periods of time by their parents in search of food. Intervening could leave your scent, or cause unintentional harm to the wildlife.
- Moving young or injured wildlife to a different location can be fatal as they will be disoriented and at greater risk of predation.
- If wildlife need to be rescued, it should always be done by trained and/or licensed individuals.

Out of respect for them, please give wildlife their space and admire them from afar by taking only photographs.





TURTLES ON THE MOVE—GIVE THEM A BRAKE!

It's turtle nesting season, meaning that turtles will be travelling to nesting sites in sandy areas. Sometimes this means crossing the road (or even laying their eggs in the sandy shoulders of the roadways).

All 8 of the native turtle species in Ontario are listed as of concern, and road mortality is one of the reasons why. Please be vigilant when driving, as turtles could easily be mistaken for debris on the road. If you spot a turtle, brake and allow them to cross. You can help encourage them across the road from behind with a car mat, but they should not be handled. They may panic and scratch/ bite you, which may prompt you to drop them. If you see a Snapping Turtle, notable by their spiky tail and size, give them plenty of space.
