Ever look at something and wonder "why" or "why not?" They're common questions constantly popping up in the mind of Evelyn Roberts, as she is the woman behind our "Wonder Wye Wednesday" posts on Facebook. From hibernating groundhogs to the physical realities of freezing ice and the spectacular showy aurora borealis, her curiosity and passion for nature are constantly being fueled by her volunteer experiences at Wye Marsh.

With a background in finance and banking, Ave was ready to take some time for herself and connect with nature on a deeper level when she retired to Waubaushene a few years ago.



"Wye Marsh was the perfect solution," she says. Ave started as a Trail Ambassador, pointing out interesting sights to visitors as they walked our trails in the summer. Then she helped out with a few special events... and became a Swan Monitor! "Swans are such beautiful birds," she says. "I love watching their behaviours and antics and trying to understand their language."

Trumpeter Swans were missing from the landscape for more than 200 years, and it took about 30 years for the Wye Marsh and Trumpeter Swan Restoration Group to work together to re-establish a self-sustaining wild population in Ontario. Seeing these magnificent creatures gliding along the channels at Wye Marsh – and on the waters of Georgian Bay – means a lot to Ave. "It makes my heart happy to see a population respond so successfully to reintroduction," she says. "To me they represent the possibility of what can be achieved in the natural world if we make the effort." She adds, "That this effort is mainly volunteer based just shows that no effort is too small, no person is too small!"

Ave recognizes that taking care of Wye Marsh is a true labour of love. "Wye Marsh has limited funding and limited staff and truly relies on its volunteers to help maintain a special place." To her, the organization is "a lovely reflection of community in action."

Thank you, Ave. We couldn't have said it better ourselves! You are so right!

PERIWINKLE

It is native to the Mediterranean basin and was introduced to North America as an ornamental plant. It easily escapes cultivation and is considered highly invasive. Periwinkle poses a threat to biodiversity because it spreads over large areas and competes with native plant species in a number of habitats. Periwinkle is still sold at some plant nurseries, so this is an existing source contributing to the invasion of this plant across the province.

GARLIC MUSTARD


It is a herb native to Europe that was brought to North America in the early 1800s for use as an edible herb. Since its arrival in North America it has escaped into the wild and is now one of Ontario's most aggressive forest invaders. Garlic mustard can invade relatively undisturbed forests. Once established it can displace native wildflowers like trilliums. It hinders other plants by interfering with the growth of fungi that bring nutrients to the roots of the plants.

SPOTTED KNAPWEED

It was accidentally introduced into North America from Western, Central and Eastern Europe in the later 1800s in contaminated alfalfa and clover seed and in soil used for ship ballast. Before it was considered a serious weed, it was spread in domestic hay and through human activities. It is a highly competitive weed that invades disturbed areas and degrades native plant communities.

Please use caution on all trails, walkways, boardwalks, waterways and property of the Wye Marsh. Appropriate hiking footwear is recommended. Slippery conditions exist when wet. Be aware that plant roots and loose rocks can create natural trip hazards when extending above paths. Immediately return to the Visitor's Centre if foul weather occurs.
