WATCH FOR

ON THE WILD SIDE:

May and June are prime turtle nesting season, and so here is your annual reminder to please be watchful for our shelled friends on the roadways. Their dark shells and slow nature often have them mistaken for debris on the road, leading the road morality. This is one of the leading treats to Ontario's turtle populations. Turtles will travel great distances for prime nesting habits in sandy areas - often on the side of roads in marshy areas. If you see a turtle on the road, please brake and give it space. If it is safe to do you may encourage it across the road from behind, or carefully pick it up with two hands from the middle. Carry it low to the ground so as to not drop it and be mindful of scratching claws. If the turtle is a Snapping Turtle, identifiable by their size, sharp beak-like mouth, and spikey tail, **DO NOT** attempt to lift it - they are swift with their powerful bite. Just encourage the turtle to move along from a safe distance.

Protected wetland habitat like Wye Marsh is crucial for our turtle populations. We hope you will join us on the boardwalk to spot the different species who live in Wye Marsh, including Painted Turtles, Blanding's Turtles, and Snapping Turtles.

Downy Woodpeckers can be found on backyard bird feeders. They make a high-pitched pik sound and the descending whinny call.

REASON FOR LIVING AT WYE MARSH: Bred in Captivity, Ex pet, owners unable to continue care.

FUN FACT:

1. There are over 800 Corn Snake Colour Morphs.

2. Snakes play an important role in environmental health by controlling the rodent population.

3. Snakes are ectothermic meaning they need an external heat source to warm their bodies and digest food.

WONDER WYE?? Wye are flowers so COLOURFUL?

Flowers rely largely on insects and birds for pollination. Vibrant colours help to attract these pollinators to land on the plant. When they land to gather the nectar or pollen for food, pollen sticks to their body and is transported to their next stop. This aids in seed dispersal and the life cycle of the plant. Sweet fragrances and unique petal shapes also help attract pollinators.

A flower's colour comes from the pigmentation in its petals. The more pigmentation, the more saturated the colour. Generally, the vibrancy and saturation of a colour are good indicators of the plant's overall health. The most common pigments are called anthocyanin and carotenoids which can create a variety of colours - reds, blues, yellows, purples, pinks, and even browns.

What is Global Big Day?

Global Big Day has become a May tradition for tens of thousands of eBirders: 24 hours to put your favorite park/county/state/province country/continent on the global birding stage. Global Big Day 2022 also falls on World Migratory Bid Day!

There are so many fascinating birds passing through Wye Marsh, Area of Natural and Scientific Interest (ANSI) that staff and volunteers will be conducting a bird count all day long.

We hope you will join us to bird, or to take part in some of these awesome activities all included with the price of admission on May 13, 2023.

7:00 am - Early Bird Guided Tour with Mak \$30

Join resident bird expert, Mak Soden, for an exclusive early morning two-hour birding excursion at Wye Marsh. With Mak as your guide, you will have access to this National Wildlife Area two hours before the gates are unlocked for visitors. Together you will: greet the morning chorus; identify bird calls; see songbirds, waterfowl, and raptors; and take in the wonders of the marsh.
